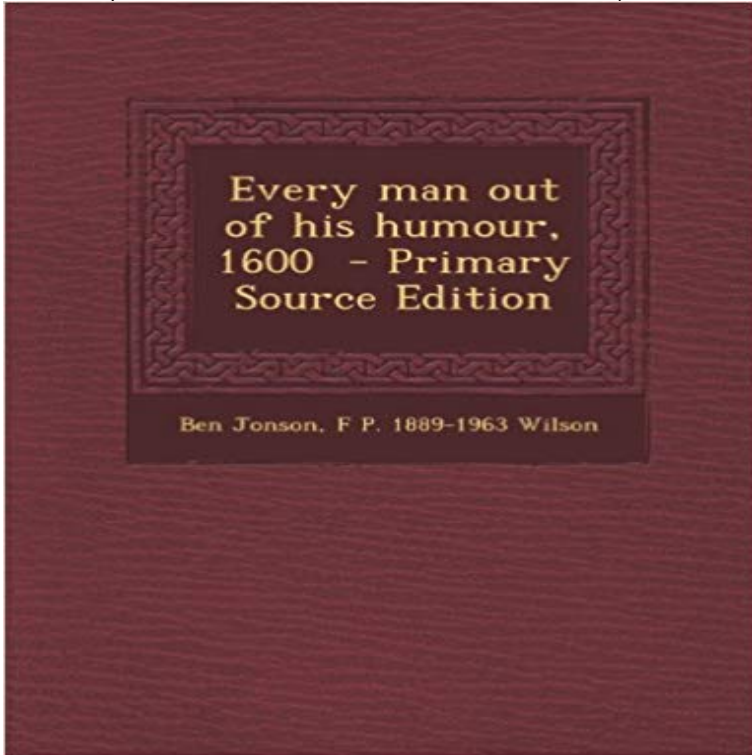


Every Man Out of His Humour, 1600 - Primary Source Edition
